# **IA. Students & Parents**


#### **II. Guidance Programmes**

#### VI. Individualized Health Counselling

During academic year 2019-20, students and teachers visited the infirmary with recurrent health complaints such as fever, head-ache, stomach pain, swelling, minor and major accidental injuries, dizziness and fainting etc. Health counselling sessions were conducted by our school doctor and nurses on a one to one basis to inform them about healthy life practices as per their condition. As and when required, such students/staff were referred to the medical experts for diagnosis & treatment. Records of one to one health counselling sessions are available with the infirmary. Detailed report in this regard has been maintained by the school health department.

### VII. Support & guidance to children with special need

Our school management strongly embraces the idea that diversity is the reality & therefore each child is a unique learner. The entire team of administrative, teaching & non teaching staff at O.P Jindal School whole heartedly support Children with Special Needs (CWSN) .The following initiatives have been taken up to support their overall development.

- Identification of specific challenges /problems of every special child by the school doctor & counsellor
- Parental counselling to seek detailed information & referral for medical /psychometric assessment (when required)
- Planning for intervention along with the Coordinator & Special Educator according to the nature of problem identified.
- Need specific special guidance classes & support teaching done by Special Educator
- Skill development training
- Relaxations & support provided for CWSN in the assessment system
- Training programme for teachers to help them in guiding & supporting CWSN
- Ensuring the accessibility of school building & other resources to special students.

The detailed record of the specialized guidance classes to implement the Individualized Educational Programmes according the requirement of Children With Special Needs have been maintained by the Special Educator.
